For the past twenty-five years the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) has filled the important role of providing educational and cultural services for Saskatchewan's Métis community. It is my distinct pleasure to be able to provide this special 25th anniversary annual report on behalf of the Institute.

2005 marks not only the Institute's quarter-century anniversary, but also a remarkable year for Métis education in Saskatchewan. Well over 700 students were served by the Institute over the course of the program year, representing opportunities for Métis people in such diverse fields as Healthcare, Apprenticeship, Trades, Education, and Business. Other Institute services to the Métis community in particular, and to the people of Saskatchewan in general, include the continued production of Métis-specific resources, the further augmentation of the province's largest library collection of Métis resource materials, and the ongoing awarding of both a scholarship foundation to support Métis post-secondary students, and a cultural development fund to support Métis community development.

The Institute celebrated its 25th anniversary by hosting a number of events, including a Métis cultural conference, an annual general meeting of the Métis Nation—Saskatchewan, and a gala banquet and awards ceremony where six outstanding individuals received the *Order of Gabriel Dumont*. A conference on the Powley Ruling affecting Métis harvesting (such as hunting, trapping and fishing) rights was also well-attended by hundreds. A distinguished panel of legal and constitutional experts provided information on this important and timely topic. Full coverage of the anniversary celebrations was presented in a special issue of New Breed Magazine, and is available online via The Virtual Museum of Métis History and Culture (www.metismuseum.ca).

Over the years, GDI has secured a prominent place in the province's and the country's educational community. Widely-recognized as a leader in Métis education in Canada, the Institute's successes have much to do with its many strengths that have been cultivated since its inception. With its Métis cultural focus, student supports and services, compassionate and dedicated staff, community-based programming, and fully-accredited and recognized courses, the Institute produces some of the highest-quality graduates in the province.

I would like to thank the GDI Board of Governors for their leadership and vision which ensures the Institute's on-going success. Many thanks are also due the staff, students, and stakeholders who make GDI a dynamic and successful institution.

∞ Gabriel Dumont Institute History

1976 – Métis cultural conference initiated planning for a Métis educational Institute.

1980 – The Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) was formed and the Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP) began operations. The Institute hosted its first annual cultural conference.

1983 – GDI began running federally-sponsored preparatory, credit skills training, and university programs.

1985 - The Napoleon LaFontaine Scholarship Foundation was established.

1989 – The Institute and Saskatchewan Justice created the first residential Community Training Residence for female offenders in Saskatchewan.

1991 – The Dumont Technical Institute (DTI) was established as a federated institute of the Saskatchewan Institute of Applied Science and Technology (SIAST).

- 1992 The Master Agreement between the Institute and Saskatchewan Education providing for the operation of DTI was signed. DTI started to deliver technical and Adult Basic Education programming within all provincial community colleges and SIAST.
 - 1993 The Institute signed an affiliation agreement with the University of Saskatchewan to create Gabriel Dumont College (GDC) – the only Métisspecific liberal arts college in Canada.
 - **1995** A two-year Métis Teacher Associate Certificate Program was developed by the Institute and the University of Saskatchewan.
 - 1996 GDC began offering Arts and Science classes.
 - **2001** DTI purchased a central administration building in Saskatoon.
 - **2002** GDI received a Saskatchewan Book Award for Ken Carriere's The Bulrush Helps the Pond and Metis Legacy.
 - 2003 GDI received two Saskatchewan Book Awards for Cheryl Troupe's Expressing Our Heritage: Métis Artistic Designs. GDI moved into new centres in Saskatoon and Regina. GDI launched The Virtual Museum of Métis History and Culture (www.metismuseum.ca).
 - 2004 GDI Publishing moved into a new centre in Saskatoon. DTI released Métis Studies Adult 10 (http://metisstudies.dev.kcdc.ca).

2005 – GDI celebrated 25 years of excellence and achievement.

GDI Milestones

GDI is the only fully accredited Métis Post-Secondary, Adult Basic Upgrading and Skills Training institution in Canada. During twenty-five years of operations, the Institute has achieved many milestones including:

- Almost 775 graduates from SUNTEP – the only Métis teacher-training program in Canada
- Thousands of graduates from DTI – the only Métis Adult Basic Education, Skills Training, Technical and Vocational institution in Canada
- The largest Métis-specific library and archival collection owned by a Métis institution or organization
- The only Métis post-secondary college in Canada GDC
- The only online Métis Studies Course (ABE 10)
- The only Métis-specific publishing house in Canada

- The only post-secondary institution to sign affiliation agreements with two universities and a provincial technical institution
- The only Métis educational institution to provide cultural funding The Métis Cultural Development Fund and scholarships The Napoleon LaFontaine and SaskEnergy Scholarships to the Métis community
- The only Aboriginal institution in Canada which fuses university, technical, cultural, publishing and social justice programming
- The first Métis institution in Canada to develop a Michiflanguage resource
- The largest online depository of Métis history and culture The Virtual Museum of Métis History and Culture

∞ The GDI Story

It was at a Métis cultural conference in 1976 that Saskatchewan's Métis first proposed the idea to develop their own educational institution. This vision became a reality in 1980 with the formal incorporation of the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI). At its inception, GDI focused on educational development through cultural research as a means to renew and strengthen the heritage and achievements of Saskatchewan's Métis. It soon became apparent, however, that the Institute would need to become more directly involved in education if it were to fully serve the multifaceted needs of the province's Métis community.

When the vision of a Métis educational institution was first articulated at the 1976 cultural conference, it would have been impossible for all those in attendance to fully imagine today's GDI. GDI has much to be proud about. As the only Métis-owned and directed educational institution of its kind in the country, the Institute is a unique fixture in Canadian education.

For a quarter century, the Institute's mission has been to promote the renewal and development of Métis culture. This continues to be accomplished through research activities and by the design, development, and delivery of Métis-specific educational and cultural materials, programs, and services. The Institute's success can be measured by the more than 700 adult students for whom it provides educational opportunities each year.

Special Features of Gabriel Dumont Institute Programs

All Gabriel Dumont Institute programs have a number of special features which meet the educational and cultural needs of the province's Métis community. These special features include:

Over the last twenty-five years, the Institute has woven many strands together to create something strong, lasting, beautiful, and useful. GDI has been enriched immensely by the vision of our founders, the support of the Métis community, the leadership of our board of governors and staff, and by the breadth, depth, and uniqueness of our programs, which preserve and promote Métis history and culture. These diverse strands contribute to the Métis Nation, the province, and the country. Taken together, they also contribute to the strength and beauty that GDI celebrates today.

GDI is distinct and reflects Métis values. It is successfully strengthening the Métis' capacity to build stronger communities and individuals through its assigned mission. The Institute recognizes the value of community and traditional knowledge, Métis customs and traditions, and the role of Elders and other community leaders in building our communities.

GDI assists the Métis by providing them with the opportunity to direct their individual and collective future. The Institute also empowers individuals and communities by building upon our many existing strengths. This in turn further builds upon our social, economic, and political capacity as an institution, as individuals, and as a community.

Teaching Excellence

Métis Youth Ambassador

Born and raised in Prince Albert, Holly Parenteau attended École Holy Cross School, where she became fluent in French. After graduating from Rivier Academy, Holly was accepted into the Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP). Holly has been able to learn more about her Métis roots through her studies and numerous cultural activities and camps. It was through Holly's membership and involvement in Métis Local # 7 that she was fortunate enough to attend, in 2002, the Council of Aboriginal People's National Youth Congress in Ottawa as a representative for Saskatchewan's Aboriginal youth. Holly continues to become more aware and involved with her Métis culture through her participation in community events, such as the Prince Albert Métis Fall Festival. Holly continues her studies as a third-year student in SUNTEP Prince Albert.


When Dumont Technical Institute (DTI) faculty member Dylan Pelletier teaches Mathematics, he makes a point of understanding what many of his students are going through. DTI student Helen Pelly is a case in point. Helen's greatest fear about going back to school could be summed up in one word: Math. Helen credits Dylan not only for helping her to understand Math, but also for believing in her and encouraging her. Dylan's emphasis on a positive attitude toward Mathematics, and his message that "Math isn't magic – it takes hard work and patience" helped Helen to overcome her Math phobia. In the end, not only did Helen master her dreaded Mathematics courses, she completed both Literacy and ABE 10 in one academic year and graduated with her Grade 12 diploma in 2005. "Once you know someone cares, then you can learn."

∞ Métis Centre of Excellence

A long-term strategic goal for the Gabriel Dumont Institute is the development of a centralized facility to increase the Métis' community presence and to house various programs. This objective is captured by the vision to develop a Métis Centre of Excellence in Saskatchewan. Support for this idea has been forthcoming from federal, provincial, and Métis governments. In 2005, a facility plan was developed that included visioning sessions, spatial needs assessments, preliminary drawings, and a business plan. A Métis Centre of Excellence would provide space for students, visitors, Métis artifacts and archival documents, and research activities. Such a facility would instill pride not only in the Métis community, but also in all Saskatchewan residents.

Giving Back to the Community

Steven Korecki grew up in the strong Métis community of St. Louis, Saskatchewan where he attended school from kindergarten to grade twelve. After high school, Steven attended the Saskatchewan Institute of Applied Science and Technology, working his way to apprentice level 1 in Professional Cooking. However, he was left with the feeling that he wanted to do more for his community. He began by looking at what he wanted his life to mean. Being Métis, Steven was aware of the Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP), and had heard that the program works closely with the community. This was exactly what he wanted. Steven was accepted into SUNTEP Prince Albert where he is now completing his second year of studies. SUNTEP has already helped him gain a great deal of knowledge regarding Métis history, and he enjoys how the program supplies not only its students, but the community, with information on the Métis people. He looks forward to graduating from SUNTEP with a Bachelor of Education Degree and to effectively use that degree in the Prince Albert area.



∞ Métis Human Resources Development Agreement

Métis control and responsibility for Métis human resources development is at the heart of the Métis Human Resources Development Agreement. The Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) is looking forward to providing a broad range of Métis human-resource development programs and services in rural, northern, and urban communities under the Government of Canada's Aboriginal Human Resources Development Strategy. The incorporation of the new training and employment entity into the GDI family effectively doubles the size of the Institute and provides the Métis with a broad range of services and support through a well-known and well-proven entity. The Institute anticipates services for Métis students and communities will be streamlined under this new approach.



➤ Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program



Established in 1980, the Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP) is a fouryear Bachelor of Education program offered by the Gabriel Dumont Institute in cooperation with the Department of Advanced Education and Employment, the University of Saskatchewan, and the University of Regina. The program is offered in three urban centres – Prince Albert, Saskatoon, and Regina – and is designed to address the need for trained and qualified Métis teachers.

SUNTEP faculty and staff have always provided students with strong cultural programming, including Native Studies and cross-cultural education with an emphasis on Métis history and culture. Since 1980, more than 775 students have graduated with a Bachelor of Education Degree. SUNTEP graduates are renowned as teachers and role models in schools across Western Canada. Their training combines a sound academic education with extensive classroom experience and a thorough knowledge of issues facing students in our society. The SUNTEP program is widely-recognized as a model in Aboriginal education.

I had the honour of recently speaking at a SUNTEP graduation. As I looked out at the sea of faces my heart swelled with pride and considerable awe remembering that it was not all that long ago when Métis people were not allowed to go to school. For many of us the dream of graduation from a university was almost an impossible one.

The ceremony also reminded me that the privilege of an education is the result of many years of struggle on the part of our parents and past Métis leaders, many of whom passed on... Thank you SUNTEP students...

Each SUNTEP centre has developed its own unique identity and operates according to the students' and community's needs. For example, second-year Regina students participate in a research trip to Winnipeg as part of their Métis history classes, where they have the opportunity to conduct genealogical research at the Hudson's Bay Company Archives and at the St. Boniface Historical Society. In Prince Albert, SUNTEP students hold an annual culture camp which includes working with resource people and Elders. SUNTEP Saskatoon organizes a variety of social events, fundraising initiatives, and educational forums which serve to increase the students' educational experience at the University of Saskatchewan, such as the annual trip to New Mexico for first-year students.

∞ Gabriel Dumont College

Gabriel Dumont College (GDC) offers the first two years of a Bachelor of Arts and Science degree through the University of Saskatchewan. GDC courses are offered in Saskatoon and Prince Albert and focus on Native Studies, Métis Studies, and Indigenous languages. GDC provides an academic, cultural, and social environment that encourages learning and academic excellence, enhances self-esteem, and stresses the value of Métis culture.

Graduate Studies

GDC will launch its *Graduate Student Bursary Program* in 2006 to encourage Saskatchewan Métis to pursue full time graduate studies and conduct research in fields related to Métis people. The program is further intended to increase Métis employment in Saskatchewan and internally within the Institute. ∞ Dumont Technical Institute

Dumont Technical Institute (DTI) is the basic education and skills-training arm of the Gabriel Dumont Institute. DTI has been in operation since 1992 and provides quality, community-based educational opportunities and services to Saskatchewan's Métis community. A hallmark of the Institute is its community-based delivery. DTI programs are delivered on a needs basis in Métis communities across the province. Today, DTI provides services to well over 500 students annually and employs more than 40 people.



DTI's Basic Education and Adult 12 programs provide learners with increased opportunities in the labour market, with options for post-secondary education, and with satisfaction and a personal sense of accomplishment. Students of these programs put forward a positive effort to ensure that their future and the future of Métis people shines bright.

Opening New Doors

David Davidson Jr. was a single parent when he made the commitment to return to school to make a better future for himself and his three young children. David entered a literacy program at Dumont Technical Institute (DTI) in 2003 and never looked back, going on to complete Adult 10, then graduating from Grade 12 in 2006. Although David faced challenges along the way, his commitment to his education and the encouragement of his fellow students helped him to persevere. David is now enrolled in the DTI/SaskEnergy Induction Training Program and expects to gain full-time employment upon completion. According to David, "if you set your goals high and put your mind to reaching them, it can be done".

Health-sector training and trades training have been driving forces behind DTI's skills-training programming. Programs include Practical Nursing, Continuing Care Aid, Carpentry, 1A Certified Truck Driving, Power Engineering, and Heavy Equipment Operator. DTI programs respond to the labour market demands of the various regions of the Métis Nation — Saskatchewan to provide relevant training leading to increased employment for Métis people.

DTI's strategic goals for 2005 included enhancing DTI's participation in skills training with a new focus to apprenticeshiptype training, enhancing DTI's Basic Education programming, and establishing stronger links with the Métis Employment and Training of Saskatchewan Inc. (METSI). These goals were addressed by offering over 25 trades-training opportunities, hiring an Apprenticeship Coordinator, responding to community-training requests, being involved in Basic Education provincial task teams, advisory committees and pilot projects, and engaging with METSI on many initiatives in the Métis community, including labour market needs assessments and program partnerships.

∞ Scholarships and Awards

The Institute has been administering scholarships for Métis people since the early 1980s via the *Gabriel Dumont Scholarship Foundation*. The scholarship fund is based on a 1.24 million-dollar capital investment. All scholarships are awarded on the interest earned. A Scholarship Trustees and Selection Committee award scholarships twice per year.

Napoleon LaFontaine Economic Development Scholarship Program

The Napoleon LaFontaine Economic Development Scholarship Program was established to encourage Saskatchewan's Métis to pursue full-time education and training that enhances their social, cultural, and economic development. These scholarships are awarded in the following categories: Entrance, Undergraduate, Graduate, Graduation, Loan Remission, and Special.

Napoleon LaFontaine was instrumental in organizing the Association of Métis and Non-Status Indians of Saskatchewan. Over the years, he devoted himself to developing social and educational policies for Aboriginal people. These scholarships are so named in recognition of his many contributions.

SaskEnergy - Métis Incorporated Scholarship Program

In 1998, SaskEnergy made a five-year commitment to the Gabriel Dumont Institute and the Dumont Technical Institute to fund scholarships for a total of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) per Institute, annually. SaskEnergy continues to fund these scholarships annually.

Success Takes Many Paths

When Christine Tinker was a child she dreamed of becoming a nurse. She never lost that dream, and so, as an adult with a new-born baby, she returned to school to complete her Grade 12. After a great deal of hard work and determination, Christine received her high school diploma and was accepted into the Dumont Technical Institute Practical Nursing program. But it was during this program that Christine found herself up against too many odds. When she had to withdraw from the program she felt like her dreams had been crushed. Still, Christine was not deterred. Instead, she enrolled in the Continuing Care Aid program. Completing that certificate gave Christine the confidence to go back and finish her Practical Nursing course. Christine says, "Never give up. There is always a different road to take." Christine shows us that dreams can come true.




The Gabriel Dumont Institute Publishing Department provides many services to the Métis and larger communities. These services include:

- · An award-winning book publishing program
 - A curriculum and cultural resource production program
 - A research component focusing on cultural, editorial, educational, and historical expertise
 - An archival resource centre and Métis-specific museum
 - An online-learning community anchored on The Virtual Museum of Métis History and Culture (www.metismuseum.ca) and The Back to Batoche Interactive Website (www.virtualmuseum.ca/Exhibitions/Batoche/index.html)

A primary component of this diverse range of services is the Department's mandate to produce Métis-specific educational and cultural resources. This is done through strategic partnerships with the Saskatchewan Department of Advanced Education and Employment, Saskatchewan Learning, Parks Canada, the Department of Canadian Heritage, and the Government of Canada. The Publishing Department is strongly committed to ensuring that Saskatchewan's Métis has a strong voice in all decision-making bodies effecting curriculum development, book publishing, and cultural and heritage programming including those for museums, archives, and the preservation of the Michif languages.

The Publishing Department is honoured to receive direction from the province's Métis community in all of its endeavours.



∞ Library and Information Services

The Library supports the information and research needs of Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) and Dumont Technical Institute programs. The Library has three branches located in Regina, Saskatoon, and Prince Albert. Its unique collection focuses on Métis history and culture and on issues of concern to Métis and First Nations communities. The Library actively seeks to work in partnership with all other library and information services to provide free and unrestricted access to information.

The GDI Library provides valuable library services for Aboriginal people, an important step towards ensuring that they have full access to library services in Saskatchewan



∞ Métis Cultural Development Fund

The Institute has developed the *Métis Cultural Development Fund* (MCDF) in partnership with SaskCulture Inc. The program is designed to preserve, strengthen, and transmit Métis culture and traditions in Saskatchewan. The MCDF places emphasis on children, building cultural leadership skills, transferring knowledge between generations, skills development mentorship, and having fun. The activities funded through this program encourage gathering, sharing, learning, celebrating, and developing Métis culture in Métis communities.

The MCDF Selection Committee, made up of members of the Métis community, meets twice a year, following the May and October grant deadlines. For 2005, \$81,000 was granted to community-based, grassroots projects.

Back to Batoche is the only website dedicated exclusively to the role of Batoche in the formation of Métis identity through time and place. This fully bilingual website brings Batoche's vibrant socioeconomic and cultural life together through a variety of interactive activities including games, music, quizzes, personalized virtual tours, videos, and photo albums. Both entertaining and informative, the website is bolstered by hundreds of pages of background text relating to the 1885 Resistance, as well as Elders' interviews, photographs, and video clips from the annual Back to Batoche celebration.

Métis Studies Adult 10

Written from a Métis perspective by the Dumont Technical Institute, *Métis Studies Adult 10* is designed to meet provincial credit requirements for Social Science Adult 10 in an accessible, online format. *Métis Studies Adult 10* provides learners with an introduction to Métis history as well as the opportunity to examine contemporary Métis issues. The course consists of five modules: Métis Identity, Métis Lands, Métis Governance, Métis Leaders and Métis Resistance. Revenue

For the 2005-2006 year, the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) had combined revenue in the form of operating grants, program funding, tuition fees, investment income, and other sources for GDI, Dumont Technical Institute (DTI), Gabriel Dumont College, Community Training Residence, and the Gabriel Dumont Scholarship Foundation totalling \$8,731,645.

Revenue from the Government of Saskatchewan for operations, program delivery, and other contracts accounts for 70% of the Institute's total revenue. While GDI and DTI received increases in operating grants, and DTI experienced increases in program delivery revenues from the Province, decreases occurred in tuition and course cost recovery for Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP) enrolments. This revenue is based on actual enrolments in SUNTEP programs.

2005 marks the final payment on a ten-year loan that was part of an agreement between the Institute and the province in 1995 to assist the Institute with an operational deficit.

Operating Expenditures

Overall, the Institute's expenditures increased by \$1.1 million to \$8,731,645 – a 12.6 percent increase from the previous year. Increases in expenditures are due largely to increases in program delivery (DTI) and increases in core operations. Furthermore, administrative services increased due to systems upgrades. This category of increased expenditure is not anticipated to be sustained in future years.

The Institute has undertaken a Joint Job Evaluation process which intensified over the past year, resulting in increased travel expenditures. In addition, the Institute's anniversary celebrations account for a significant portion of the travel expenditures for this fiscal year and do not represent an anticipated on-going increase to this category of expenditures.

Salaries increased due to increased staffing directly related to enhanced program delivery, particularly at DTI. Salary increases can also be attributed to higher salary rates. The Institute's in-scope staff forms a collective bargaining unit under the Saskatchewan Government and General Employees' Union and is in a current agreement that will expire March 31, 2007. Salaries account for approximately 43 percent of the Institute's total expenditures.
