Métis Centre of Excellence

In 2004, the Gabriel Dumont Institute (GDI) adopted a five-year Strategic Plan that included a vision to develop a centrallylocated, Métis-specific facility for Saskatchewan. Such a centralized facility - a Métis Centre of Excellence - would increase both the Métis' presence and profile in Saskatchewan, while housing various programs. Support for this idea has been forthcoming from federal, provincial, and Métis governments.

In 2005, a facility plan was developed that included vision sessions, spatial needs assessments, and preliminary drawings. Currently, the GDI Board of Governors has identified a preliminary drawing for the building that meets these identified needs. A concept paper is being prepared for the early part of June with the full business plan to follow. A Métis Centre of **Excellence** would ideally be located in Saskatoon. It would provide space for students, visitors, Métis

artifacts, and research activities.

An example of the value of such a facility is illustrated by the Institute's Museum and Archives. GDI houses what is perhaps the largest Métis artifact collection held by a Métis organization. The collection includes a wide array of artifacts relating to material culture (mittens, gauntlets, sashes, bags, pouches, iackets, and moccasins etc); lifeways (snow shoes, fur presses, traps, a canoe, a stove, and a sewing machine); resistance (artifacts from the 1885 Resistance); and commissioned artwork. including paintings. sculptures, and beaded panels. Regarding the size of the Institute's collection, it is estimated that the Museum/ **Publishing Department** office has about 700 artifacts, which will require a curatorial room at least three times the size of the present one to house all current and future acquisitions. In addition, the Institute holds an archival collection that has hundreds of audiovisual

materials, and several large filing cabinets full of documents. The Métis Centre of Excellence would allow GDI to display its entire archival and artifact collection to the benefit of both the Métis and larger communities. The Publishing Department has also been actively digitizing the Institute's archival and artifact collections, and uploading them on The Virtual Museum of Métis History and Culture (www.metismusuem.ca).

The Métis Centre of Excellence will instill pride in the Métis community, while providing all Saskatchewanians with further insights into Métis history and culture. GDI continues to work toward achieving this exciting strategic initiative.

Dumont Technical Institute Update:

The Dumont Technical Institute (DTI) was incorporated in 1992 as GDI's Adult Basic Upgrading and Skills Training program. DTI provides Basic Education courses in Métis communities across the province including Literacy, ABE 10, and Adult 12, as well as preparation programs for students entering Skills Training. Furthermore, DTI offers Certificate and Diploma programs via a federation agreement with the Saskatchewan Institute of Applied Science and Technology. DTI provides services to well over 500 students annually, and employs more than 40 people.

Basic Education:

Currently, DTI is delivering <u>17</u> Basic Education programs throughout the province. For 2006-2007,

there are **315** training seats in DTI Basic Education programs. The overall enrollment for DTI Basic Education programs in 2006-2007 is projected to be between **370** and **400**.

Skills Training:

DTI has had an exciting and challenging year delivering Skills Training programs. Trades, oilfield-related programs, health-related programs, and business-related programs have been our focus for 2006-2007.

Plans for 2007-2008 Program Year:

Plans are shaping up for some exciting new DTI programs. Some of the possible program offerings include Practical Nursing in both Prince Albert and Saskatoon. Initial discussions are underway with the Department of Highways in Prince Albert to deliver a Heavy Duty

Truck and Transport Mechanics program. DTI is anticipating another partnership with SaskEnergy for Induction Training, and plans to mirror the success that this program achieved this past year. DTI is also having very preliminary discussions regarding the delivery of an Oil Rig Technician program in northwestern Saskatchewan, as well as Medical Sonography (Ultrasound technicians) in Saskatoon. These types of initiatives are expensive, and will take a large amount of resources; however, they may be achievable through some creative partnerships. Be on the look out for DTI's exciting new programs.



DTI Signs Apprenticeship Agreement

DTI has just entered into an agreement with the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship Training and Certification Commission (SATCC). SATCC will now provide financial resources to help support a joint DTI/GDI Training and Employment Apprenticeship Coordinator position. The contract with SATCC is effective from January to June 2007. It is expected that this contract will be renewed for the 2007-2008 training year.

Saskatchewan Métis Demographics

The Métis are
Canada's fastest
growing Aboriginal
population. The
following demographic
information has been
compiled based on
2001 census data,
and other sources.
Some facts about
Saskatchewan's Métis
population:

- According to the 2001 Census, the Métis comprised 33.6% of the province's Aboriginal population.
- Saskatchewan Métis make up 4.5% of the province's overall population. (2001 Census)
- The provincial Métis population is expected to rise again in the 2006 Census Reports

(Aboriginal reports are to be released in January 2008).

- The Métis are the fastest growing Aboriginal group in Canada, with a 43% growth rate between the 1996 and 2001 Censuses.
- This growth rate is due to both demographic growth (about 10%), and reporting changes (about 33%). Even with these reporting changes, no other Aboriginal group experienced this level of growth.
- The number of Métis people in Saskatchewan is projected to more than double over the next 30 years,

based on current demographic trends (population projections - First Nations and Métis Relations, Saskatchewan).

Given the demographics, both current and projected, the need for Métiscontrolled education remains high. While social justice issues for the Métis have come to the fore in the past couple of decades, there is still a disparity between the Métis and the non-Aboriginal population, in terms of education. employment, housing, health, and other social indicators.

SUNTEP Graduation Ceremonies

May is graduation month for the Saskatchewan Urban Native Teacher Education Program (SUNTEP). SUNTEP graduation ceremonies honour the achievement of students who have completed the requirements for their Bachelor of Education degree. Since 1980, more than 830 students have graduated with a Bachelor of Education Degree.

On Friday, May 25, 2007 SUNTEP Regina celebrated its 24th annual graduation with 14 students receiving their degrees. On May 18, 2007 SUNTEP Prince Albert celebrated the graduation of 23 students. SUNTEP Saskatoon held their graduation on April 28, 2007 to honour 18 grads. Congratulations to all the graduates!
