Francois Renville (Rainville) (b. 1815)

Francois Renville was born at Pembina the son of Joseph Renville and Miniyuhe (Dakota) ¹. He worked for the NWC as a voyageur. He married Marguerite Belgarde (b. 1817), the daughter of Alexis Belgarde and Marguerite Dufort. They appear in the 1850 Pembina Census as family # 99. Francois was 35, Marguerite age 33, Francois Jr. age 13, Marguerite age 9, Marie age 7, Genevieve age 5, Adelaide age 3 and Baptiste age 2.

¹ Joseph Renville was born in 1755 in a Sioux Indian encampment or settlement, near Green Bay in Wisconsin Territory. He married a Dakota woman, Miniyuhe, the daughter of Chief Big Thunder, (who was also grandfather to Chief Little Crow). The marriage to Miniyuhe was in Green Bay, Wisconsin in 1775. They also had a son, Victor Renville, who was killed in battle with Chippewas in 1833. Victor was father of the famous Gabriel Renville who was the original chief of the Sisseton-Wahpeton reservation.
