## **Jayden Roufosse Earns Journeyperson Certification**

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Ever since he was a young boy, Jayden has always liked making things. In high school, he took the Saskatchewan Youth Apprenticeship (SYA), a program that aims to raise awareness of apprenticeship by helping youth discover the rewards of working in the skilled trades.

According to the Saskatchewan
Apprenticeship and Trade
Certification Commission,
the program not only
promotes skilled trades as
first-choice careers, but also
keeps students in school to
acquire the basic and
essential skills necessary for
success in the workplace
while providing them with a
head start on their skilled
trades career.

Soon after he completed high school in 2015, Jayden started working with D.A.B. Welding and Repair Ltd. in Saskatoon. His supervisor then told him about the

Gabriel Dumont Institute Indigenous Apprenticeship program. The supervisor told Jayden that it was better for him to register as an apprentice through the Indigenous Apprenticeship program so that his trade hours would count towards journeyperson certification. Jayden attended an apprenticeship information session at Gabriel Dumont Institute, which led to the signing of a partnership agreement by Gabriel Dumont Institute and D.A.B. Welding and Repair Ltd.

Jayden started his apprenticeship training with the Gabriel Dumont Institute Indigenous Apprenticeship program in February 2016, and on March 31, 2016, was indentured as an apprentice with the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Commission. Because Jayden had completed the SYA Program in high school, he had accumulated 300 hours of trade time credit by the time he started at the Indigenous Apprenticeship program.

He successfully challenged the certification examination, and on April 26, 2019 became the newest GDI Indigenous Apprenticeship Program client to attain the Interprovincial Red Seal Journeyperson Welder certification. In addition, Jayden holds all his Welding tickets through the Canadian Welding Bureau (CWB). His employer accommodated him and let him challenge all the CWB tests on site.

Noting that he learned many important lessons during his apprenticeship training, Jayden stated that "one of the key lessons I learned was to have patience and that you can never have enough practice." It was through patience and a just-keep-going attitude that Jayden excelled in his chosen trade of welding.

Jayden enjoys his job because of the different tasks that each day often brings and "the feeling you get after completing something that took lots of hard work." His future career goals include "learning as much as possible about the welding industry" and to be self-employed.

When asked about advice he would give to other Indigenous persons who are thinking of a career in the trades, Jayden said: "Believe in yourself and your abilities to do anything you set your mind on. Also, listen to the people with many years of experience in your chosen trade."

Jayden expressed appreciation for the advice, encouragement, and financial support that the Gabriel Dumont Institute Indigenous Apprenticeship Program gave him.

A major purge was definitely in order.

An unanticipated curve ball was that the new building wasn't quite ready to accept our cargo in the designated places, so it went wherever it could fit. We are now in the process of unpacking these items and determining how and where they will go, given

that we didn't really have a sense of the space we would have until we actually became part of it.

This has been an out-of-theordinary summer for our department as we still attended to our regular work which gets busier in summer because of the numerous cultural events we attend from June to September.

The new space is wonderful and we are delighted to be working among our colleagues. While we anticipate some growing pains for all of us, the positives will outweigh these short-term blips in the process.

We greatly appreciate the help and patience of all of the Institute staff and the support we received from those more directly involved. We look forward to getting to know everyone better and to sharing our own Métis Centre of Excellence with you and others.

Employment Counsellor at
Gabriel Dumont Institute

closely with Jayden over the
past three years. She states
that, "Jayden always had a

like him." She added, "Jayden was my first client to attain a Journeyperson certification!"

Examination for the Interprovincial Journeyperson Welder is developed by a national committee of worker and employer representatives and is based on industry standards and expectations. To write the interprovincial journeyperson examination, the candidate must either successfully complete an apprenticeship training program - like Jayden did - or meet tradesperson eligibility requirements. The examination has written and practical components, with a pass mark

of 70 percent. Apprentices are required to complete three years or 5,400 trade hours before they can take the interprovincial journeyperson examination. More information is available on the Saskatchewan Apprenticeship and Trade Certification Commission website at

## **Facilities Operations Update**

Gabriel Dumont Institute Facilities Operations and Management is the unit responsible for maintenance, renovation, and construction of the Institute's physical fabric. Below are the updates on the Institute facilities.

The end of August 2019 will wrap up an exciting year of construction which has included very exciting and rewarding projects. The expansion of the Gabriel **Dumont Institute Central** Office Building on 917 22nd Street in Saskatoon that started in the summer of 2018 has been completed which includes a new roofing system as well as new heating and cooling systems.

The new 8,400 square foot space now houses the Métis Culture and Heritage Department and Gabriel Dumont Institute Press. It also includes new office space for Gabriel Dumont Institute Training and Employment employees as well as a new Institute boardroom.

The grand opening for the 917 22nd Street facility is projected to be this fall and will be announced as soon as possible.

A new parking lot has been built at 114 Avenue J South behind the Central Office Building while existing parking lots at both the Central Office and the Dumont Technical

Institute Building on 1003 22nd Street West have been renovated. Facilities Operations and Management unit will continue to be very busy in the fall with ongoing projects such as the roof replacement and interior renovations at the GDI Prince Albert facility following a flooding event this spring.

In recent years, the Institute has made significant investments in all of its properties in Regina, Saskatoon, Prince Albert, and La Loche. We are very proud to provide a safe and positive learning environment that is interactive, engaging, and affirms Métis culture and identity.

## **HR Corner: Employees Who Are Caregivers**

According to a report compiled employee's ability to function by the Mental Health Commission of Canada, very high levels of stress are reported by 16.5% of Canadians in family caregiving roles. The report states that Canada's aging population means higher projected numbers of people with chronic illnesses. This may result in an increase in the number of family caregivers and consequently, an increase in the population subject to excessive stress.

The Canadian Human Rights Commission (CHRC) states that one in four Canadians is providing care to family and/or close friends. Many are struggling to balance caregiving obligations with work responsibilities. When an employee is a caregiver of someone with mental health issues there can be a significant impact on the

productively in the workplace.

It is also creating issues for employees who are struggling to balance work and caregiving, and for employers that have concerns about increased absenteeism, stress-leave and loss of productivity.

Studies have shown that employers that allow flexible work arrangements have been able to reduce absenteeism, foster employee loyalty. improve morale and retention, and increase productivity.

Below are some strategies that may enable an employee to stay productive while providing care to a loved one with health related issues. Offering flexible scheduling, task assignment and, if possible, work-at-home arrangements.

Planning for situations when the employee has to leave suddenly, or unexpectedly cannot come to work.

Managing co-worker concerns and reactions.

Ensuring that the workplace culture supports overall employee well-being.

Apprising the employee of the resources that may be available for them through work and within the community.

Establishing regular check-ins with the employee to see how they are doing.

## **Métis Post-Secondary Education Funding Update**

July 19, 2019 marked an important milestone in Métis education. The Métis Nation—Saskatchewan President Glen McCallum and Education Minister Dr. Earl Cook announced \$89 million in post-secondary education funding for Métis across the province. The funding was part of a national Métis Nation 10-year Education Strategy.

As the post-secondary education arm of the Métis Nation—Saskatchewan, Gabriel Dumont Institute was tasked with delivering two critical areas for federal investments identified in the Métis Education Strategy. These include direct financial support for Métis post-secondary students; and delivering support for post-secondary education student services.

On August 2, 2019, an online application portal for the Métis post-secondary funding went live on the Institute website amid much public anticipation. With the application deadline of

August 16, 2019 and less than three weeks before the new school year starts, there was a feeling of apprehension despite the strong confidence in the IT Team under the leadership of Gareth Griffiths.

However, everything went very well. The Web Group, including Gareth Griffiths, Audrey Hestand, David Morin, and James Oloo, conducted an effective social media campaign to ensure that as many people as possible were aware of the Métis post-secondary funding application.

Between August 2 and August 16, Facebook posts about the funding application reached 56,800 people – which is more than the populations of Prince Albert, North Battleford, and Warman combined! The post had over 6,400 clicks and 120 comments. Twitter posts on the same received 2,010 impressions. 'Impression' refers to the number of times a tweet was seen by Twitter users.

Gabriel Dumont Institute Selection Committees are currently reviewing the applications received. It is expected that the applicants for the Métis post-secondary education funding will be notified during the first week of September 2019.

It is a wonderful time at the Métis Nation as we mark the beginning of something good, namely, offering meaningful support for Métis post-secondary education in Saskatchewan.

While Gabriel Dumont Institute Training and Employment has provided funding (through the federal Indigenous Skills and Employment Training Strategy or ISETS) to Métis students who are attending post-secondary education, request for financial support has grown exponentially in recent years.

Until now, inequities in the way that the federal government supports the post-secondary education needs of Indigenous students has led to the exclusion of Métis from funding available to other Indigenous students.

## **Beauval ABE Achieve Record 100% Graduation Rate**
